Have You Ever Been Thrown Out of Church?

In 1997, a young man came to me in fear and trembling. He had started coming to worship but was afraid to commit to membership. We were an Open and Affirming church and spoke of God's extravagant welcome. Nevertheless, this young man was worried that we "were not for real." I told him, *"What you see is what you get. This is really who we are."*



After a long conversation in which we laughed and cried about his journey, he asked, *"Will you baptize me?"* I hesitated, knowing that he had been very active in his last church. He had been baptized. But he had been driven out of church by the pastor. One Sunday during worship, the pastor "outed" him in front of his wife and children while preaching the Sunday sermon. *He said, "My pastor told me I was evil and that my baptism wasn't real. He threw me out of church and took away my baptism."*

I was shocked. I could not imagine being thrown out of church, especially the way it had happened. Moreover, I was angry at the audacity of a pastor to "take away" baptism. Baptism is a graceful gift from God. It is not "owned" by the pastor of any church. I believed this man's baptism wasn't "true" because of the baptizer, not the baptizand. Shortly after this, we welcomed him into our church through the sacrament of baptism.

Since then, I have heard too many other horror stories about men and women being cast out of church by pastors who are anti-gay. In the United Church of Christ, we claim to be extravagant in our welcome. For many of our churches, this is true. However, it is not true everywhere in our denomination. Not every UCC church is Open and Affirming.

First Congregational UCC is a special community of faith. At First Church, we do our best to live into our Open and Affirming statement. We welcome people no matter who they are or where they are on life's journey. In September, we will lift up and celebrate our 160 years of extravagant welcome. We also will celebrate our 10 years as an Open and Affirming church in September.

Be joyful and celebrate God's glorious welcome in our community in of faith. Bring your friends. Bring your family. Bring your neighbors. Bring yourselves to our church. If you know anyone who has been thrown out or felt left out of church, bring him or her. We have a place for them in our family of faith.

Everyone is welcome here! I cannot wait to see you in church!

Lenten Small Groups Begin Soon

Joyfully we step into Lent in a few weeks. Last year, 115 people participated in 12 small groups. Our theme for 2011 was "prayer." As we prepare for the arrival of Dr. Walter Brueggemann in May, we will use his book *Great Prayers of the Old Testament* this year.

The small groups will meet four or five times throughout late February and March. Each small group meeting will be 60-90 minutes. We hope that every member takes time to join with others in their community to pray, study and grow in relationship with God and one another.

‘It’s About Time’

Sermon Series on Homosexuality Set for February 12 and 19

The greatest sign of a healthy church in the 21st century is our unconditional welcome of all people. First Church is a healthy church. We welcome everyone “no matter who they are or where they are on life’s journey.”

Unfortunately, in too many places in the Christian communion across the globe, there is an unhealthy truth - gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, and transgender persons are not welcome.

I was touched deeply at Lessons and Carols in December when a woman approached me and thanked me for a sermon I had preached 20 years ago. It was a sermon about unconditional welcome to her as a lesbian Christian. She said, “I still carry that sermon around.”

It has been six years since I have specifically addressed questions about LGBT issues from the pulpit of First Church. That is too long! Too often, you and I take it for granted that we are an Open and Affirming church. It is part of the fabric of our faith and our life together. Nevertheless, I feel a strong need to preach on how the Bible and the Church deal with homosexuality.

This month, I will preach for two weeks on the issues of homosexuality in the Bible and in the universal church. Spread the word! Bring your children, friends and family. Bring your neighbors and colleagues who belong to churches where LGBT folks are not welcome.

Did you Know . . .

. . . that the Sanctuary flowers on Sunday are part of the ministry of First Church. Each Sunday, the Deacons make bouquets from the arrangement to deliver to those on the prayer list. If there has been a dedication, a bouquet is given to the family.

. . . that the Carrie Schumacher endowment fund provides \$1,000 for the flowers for the year.

. . . that the cost of the flowers each Sunday is \$63. The trustees fund can cover the cost of 15 Sundays. Easter and Christmas Sundays are special Sundays with dedications of lilies and poinsettias. Individuals and families dedicated flowers on 20 Sundays in 2011.



. . . that some families dedicate flowers yearly on a Sunday that holds significant meaning to them.

. . . that there are 53 Sundays in 2012. In order to have a fresh arrangement every Sunday that can then be given to people on the care and concern list, it is important that we have a dedication on **36 Sundays** this year. Make Plans for Observing This Lenten Season

Shrove Tuesday is February 21, the day before Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent.

The term “Shrove” comes from “shriving” – to confess or repent and seek absolution. This was once a common practice on the day. We encourage all to plan activities that will help your family be ready for the solemn season ahead. First, have a family “game plan.” Call a family meeting. Talk about what Lent means and why it is important. Discuss where, when and how to observe Lent together. For example, will you devote a certain time each week or each day for activities or Bible study?



Next, consider adopting one or more spiritual disciplines. Spiritual disciplines are traditions that can be practiced throughout Lent. They can help us grow closer to God by cutting out distractions and refocusing our time and talents. They include giving things up, taking things on and participation.

To encourage participation, it may help to guide children in picking something that’s realistic for their age and maturity. It can be as simple as devoting time to learning a prayer or memorizing a short Bible passage. Adopt a spiritual discipline as a family, such as giving up some or all TV and devoting the extra time to mission work or Bible study. Mark a chart to check weekly progress.



Another way to start the season is to attend the pancake dinner at First Church. Making pancakes was a good way to use up all the fat, cream and

eggs in the house before Lent fasting began. This old tradition inspired the term “Fat Tuesday” or in French, “Mardi Gras.”

It also inspired the pancake dinner that many congregations hold today. The First Church youth will

host a pancake dinner on Tuesday, February 21, from 5:30-7:30 p.m. in the Parish Hall. You may purchase tickets in advance after each service or at the door. Tickets are \$4 for adults and \$3 for children 12 and under. The Treble Choir and Youth Choir will also provide entertainment during the event beginning at 7. They will perform *Moses and the Freedom Fanatics*. This should be a great event.

If you can’t attend the pancake dinner, then throw your own family pancake dinner. Have children place fruit over their pancakes in a cross shape. If family members are going to give up favorite food or drinks, you may want to include these in your family dinner, too.

It’s Time for Camp Registration!

If the Outdoor Ministries summer camp information has arrived, can spring be far behind? Everyone is ready to plan some fun in the sun and that’s just what camp is. There are camps for kindergarten children and first graders with a grandparent. Weeklong camps are for children who have completed second grade and older. Should You Upgrade Computer to Microsoft Windows 7?

Many of u, including the church, have Windows XP or Windows Vista on our computers for our operating system. Upgrading to Windows 7 offers a number of benefits. If you have Microsoft XP or Vista you may want to consider upgrading.

In 2014, Microsoft Windows XP and Windows Vista in 2017 will no longer be supported by Microsoft. That means no updates to your XP operating system, which may cause you to get viruses, spam and other operating problems. Here's a list of things to do before you purchase the upgrade:



1. Check your hardware to make sure you have the requirements to upgrade to Windows 7:

- 1 GHz or faster processor (both versions)
- 1 GB (32-bit) or 2 GB (64-bit) RAM
- 16 GB (32-bit) or 20 GB (64-bit) minimum free hard drive space

To see if your computer has all these requirements go to **My Computer** on your desktop or on the **Start** menu, right-click **Properties**.

2. Will your software still run on Windows 7? Major vendors such as Adobe, Symantec, Intuit should be fine; however, free software you may be using may not.

3. How will you benefit from upgrading to Windows 7?
- a. Improved program compatibility
 - b. More flexibility
 - c. Simplified networking. **HomeGroup**, a new feature, allows you to access files, share files, etc., even if you do not have a server.

One more thing to note: MS Windows 8.0 was supposed to be released in September 2012 but rumor has it there are problems with the software and more testing is needed before it can be released. I wouldn't recommend waiting for it to be released, and would go ahead and upgrade to Windows 7.

Radical Love

Started by syndicated columnist and activist Dan Savage in response to a rash of suicides committed by young people within the LGBT community, the *It Gets Better Project* is a viral video campaign where people from all walks of life – gay, straight and transgender – actively encourage people struggling with their sexuality, pointing out that they are not alone in their difficulties.

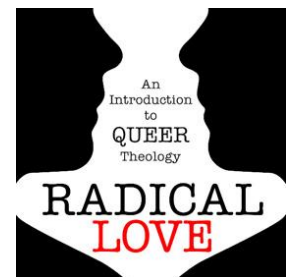
The videos posted on the site (www.itgetsbetter.org) are inspiring and touching, as actors, businessmen, writers, teachers, kids, moms, dads, and, yes, even Christians, share personal stories, while lending their voices to a powerful movement. Which begs the question: Is it getting better within the church?

The answer is both yes and no. Within some religious circles, "gay Christian" is still considered an oxymoron. And even some people of faith with a more progressive

view of gender and sexuality can still be confused as to how the LGBT community might effectively integrate into the life of the church. Here at First Congregational, not only are we preparing to celebrate 10 years as an Open and Affirming congregation, we also are taking steps to raise the profile of the church as a home for those in the LGBT community seeking to explore and grow in their faith.

In an effort to make things better, so to speak, First Congregational recently sponsored a visit from the UCC's own Rev. Kate Huey for a special discussion regarding LGBT issues, conducted a three-week class on scripture and homosexuality, currently serves as the host building for Dignity Columbus, will be presenting a two-week sermon series from Rev. Ahrens in February on LGBT issues, and will be hosting the 8th annual Equality Ohio Leadership Summit in March. We also will be presenting a five-week book study beginning Monday, February 27, from 7-8:p.m., based around the excellent book *Radical Love: An Introduction to Queer Theology* by Patrick Cheng.

Cheng (whose blog you can read at www.patrickcheng.net) is an ordained minister and professor at the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, and has written a book that is both challenging and accessible for theologians and lay people. It should provide opportunities for some challenging and insightful conversations, not the least of which will surround the use of the term "queer."



As Cheng writes, "Isn't 'queer' a derogatory word? For some, the word 'queer' has painful connotations, especially if they were subjected to it as an epithet as a result of perceived or actual differences in sexuality or gender identity." However, as Cheng points out, biblical and theological scholars, when discussing theological interpretation through an LGBT lens, have commonly used this somewhat controversial term.

This and other challenging issues will undoubtedly be confronted as we engage the book *Radical Love*. We hope that you will be able to join us for this exciting study series as First Congregational continues to do its part to make it better.



Fair Trade: It's About Small Farmers

In the Fair Trade movement there are questions about whether or not sourcing Fair Trade coffee should extend beyond small farmers to plantations.

Fair Trade evolved to give fair market access to small-scale farmers. Since Equal Exchange first brought fairly traded coffee to the U.S., they have found that partnering with small-scale farmers democratically organized in co-ops - not plantations - is the best way to create a more just food system in which small farmers can make real economic and social changes in their lives.

Rev. Ahrens Begins Doctorate Study

This month, Rev. Tim Ahrens will begin a three-year program of study at Chicago Theological Seminary toward a Doctor of Ministry degree. His emphasis will be in Public Theology. Ten credits will be spread over areas of study including theology, Biblical studies, pastoral care and preaching.

He will be on campus in Chicago the last weeks of August and January every year until graduation in May 2015. Rev. Ahrens' has been approved for this effort with support from the Personnel Committee and Church Council.
