'Christmas' in January and February

Recently, I was on the phone with a Muslim friend in Egypt. He was going to Germany to play soccer and was there around December 25. I told him Christmas in Germany is so beautiful. I said, *"You should really try to go to church and enjoy the fullness of the season."* He responded that he would be in and out of Germany **before** Christmas. *"No,"* I insisted, *"you will be there right at Christmas time."* He laughed and answered, *"Christmas is not until January 6 and I will be back in Egypt by then."*

He is right. Christmas IS January 6 in the Coptic and Eastern Orthodox tradition. Across the globe, many Catholic Christians have grand "12th Night of Christmas" or Epiphany celebrations.

Epiphany is the origin of gift-giving at Christmas time. With the arrival of the magi in Bethlehem, we know that Christmas has finally reached its conclusion. But wait! With the arrival of the magi, **the SEASON of Epiphany is just getting started.** As such, the gifts are just beginning to roll out. But, the gifts are not monetary or even physical. They are spiritual gifts. You can't package and sell these gifts. But if you open them, one text at a time, day by day, you will be blown away by the deepening of your faith.

These gifts come right from the heart of Holy Scripture. The texts of Epiphany tell of Jesus' baptism and his early ministry of teaching and healing. As you open the gift of these texts one by one for seven weeks, you will find "the best of Jesus." These are gifts of light, love, joy, peace, discipleship, stewardship, church mission and growth in faith.

Epiphany has arrived. Christmas continues. The star of Jesus is rising. Let us join the magi and pay him homage.

10 Signs That a Church is Healthy and Growing

Last month I wrote on “How Churches Die.” Having offered the very last words ever spoken in worship after 175 years at Central Presbyterian Church, I was blown away by the challenge of “closing a church.” I said I don’t ever want to do that. Moreover, I want to see First Church grow, blossom and flourish in downtown Columbus.

Here are 10 signs of a healthy and growing church:

1. *A friendly church is a growing church!* Churches grow because people bring their friends and family. When we bring friends and family, churches become places that feel close and loving and intimate.
2. *A praying church is a growing church!* Churches grow when people pray for the health and well-being of members, staff, and neighbors around the corner or across the globe.
3. *A learning and teaching church is a growing church!* When we stop reading, listening and learning, no matter what our age, we stop maturing as Christians. From cradle to grave, a church grows when the program life of Christian education stretches and develops people in the faith.
4. *A giving church is a growing church!* Does every member give money, time AND talents to the church? A growing church has all three from most or all of its members.
5. *A growing church is a mission church!* Does the church DO “hands –on” mission and support the mission of local, regional, national and global ministries? If the answer is “Yes,” it also will be a growing church.
6. *A growing church figures out how to deal with conflict in healthy ways.* I see churches that talk openly and honestly about their struggles to be churches that grow and flourish. Like healthy family systems, healthy churches talk with one another openly and with clear and loving minds and spirits.
7. *A clean and cared-for church is a growing church!* Churches grow when people take care of the space they have. Are the roofs solid? Do the walls leak? Are the floors polished and swept? Are the walls painted? Is the place dusted and clean? People notice. Growing churches are clean and cared for.
8. *New leaders are called forth and nurtured in a growing church!* Years ago, Michelle Paullo became our youngest-ever senior deacon. She was in her 20s. As Michelle grew more and more pregnant with her first daughter, Elysia, I remember her pouring the water of baptism while about to give birth herself. Wow! Here

was a young woman showing leadership at such a young age. She was excellent leader. Growing churches have excellent young leaders.

8. *Growing churches add more and more people to their ministries and then to their membership.* Sometimes we get it backwards. We think people will join our church and then get active. But growing churches welcome people to programs, small groups and worship and then to their membership. That is why I always say bring friends, family, co-workers and neighbors.

9. *Members of growing churches come to worship 2-4 times each month.* It is a priority to worship each week. You get up. You come to church. Worship begins each week the right way.

10. *Most important of: All growing churches are loving churches.* The love of God is ever-present in growing churches.

'It's About Time'

Sermon Series on Homosexuality Set for February 12 and 19

The greatest sign of a healthy church in the 21 century is our unconditional welcome of all people. First Church is a healthy church. We welcome everyone "no matter who they are or where they are on life's journey." Unfortunately, in too many places in the Christian communion across the globe, there is an unhealthy truth - gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, and transgender persons are not welcome.

I was touched deeply at Lessons and Carols when a woman approached me and thanked me for a sermon I had preached 20 years ago. It was a sermon about unconditional welcome to her as a lesbian Christian. She said, "I still carry that sermon around."

It has been six years since I have specifically addressed questions about LGBT issues from the pulpit. That is too long! Too often, you and I take it for granted that we are open and affirming. This year, we celebrate our 10th anniversary as an open and affirming church. It is part of the fabric of our faith and our life together. Nevertheless, I feel a strong need to preach on how the Bible and the church deal with homosexuality.

Next month, I will take two weeks of preaching to address the issues of homosexuality in the Bible and in the church universal in the series "It's About Time." Spread the word! Bring your children, friends and family. Bring your neighbors and colleagues who belong to churches where LGBT folks are not welcome.

The Church at the Crossroads

2012 is shaping up to be a major transitional year at First Congregational Church.



- A long range plan has been voted and studied. Some commissions have already based their budget requests on the goals of the long range plan.
- A compensation study has been completed and the challenge of compensating the church staff at median+ reflecting our church attendance and finances is influencing the 2012 budget development.
- Our 80-year-old facility is in need of comprehensive renovation to keep warmth in and water out. Stonework, tuck pointing, window repair and insulation, scupper replacement, boiler replacement and ongoing maintenance and repairs are moving to the front burner for our attention. Some of this is covered in the capital campaign, but most will require funding beyond the campaign and endowments.
- The Mission Commission has requested the increase of Our Church's Wider Mission commitment. We have slipped to 6.5% in recent years. The request is for 8.5% this year of the total pledges to the operating budget. The goal for future years is a tithe or 10 percent. In addition, the Mission Commission will facilitate a study of OCWM to re-educate the congregation about OCWM and the United Church of Christ denomination work at all levels.
- Meanwhile, people knock at our door every day for assistance in the face of severe poverty, injustice and lack of help elsewhere.

The five bullet points above are not choices, nor are they independent issues that can be resolved apart from each other. I wrote at the beginning that 2012 is a transitional year. First Congregational Church is a living, breathing organism – in less scientific but more theological terms – the Body of Christ in its local manifestation.

Business as usual in all of the areas mentioned above will not do. In order to remain alive and vibrant, we will need to meet the challenge of transitions in new and different ways than we do presently or have done in the past. As we hear what the Spirit is saying to the church, we will act in God's will.
