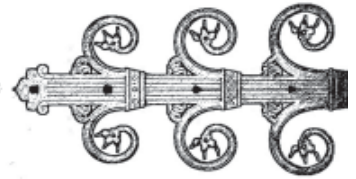

Grace Glaros, Jonah Kneuve and Alex Heer are living testimonies of resurrection faith. Each one is a child of First Congregational Church having been born, baptized and growing in the love and care of our congregation.

Each one faced life threatening challenges in their young lives and "rose" to overcome them. Each child has spent many hours of their young lives in Nationwide Children's Hospital under the care of nurses, general practitioners, surgeons, oncologists, audiologists and specialists, whose range of expertise has saved their lives.

Grace is 13 months old and has had nine surgeries since her birth and baptism at St. Ann's Hospital on Valentine's Day 2008. Born with spina bifida, Grace has been blessed with parents, Chris and Lauren, brother Lincoln (who just turned 4) and a great support system of family and friends, who have loved her into life while doctors have given her hope. Somehow, Lauren keeps teaching high school history and Chris is our state's First Assistant Attorney General. Their faith has deepened in the past year as Grace keeps rising in her young life!

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Making Sense of Life's Changes

In 1980 I was given *Transitions – Strategies for Coping with the Difficult, Painful and Confusing Times in Your Life*, a book by William Bridges. It was so helpful to me, and putting it together with *The Power of Now*, by Eckhart Tolle, I came away with guidance that gets me through troubled

When we are in transition, it helps to deal with one day at a time – living in the moment. And it helps to recognize what we all go through in transition, whether it is good or bad.

Some of the changes we all experience are: **losses of relationships**, either living or in death; changes in home life – getting married, having a child, a spouse retiring, returning to school, moving or remodeling a house, increasing domestic tension; **personal changes**, getting sick, experiencing notable success or failure; **work and financial changes**, changing or losing a job, declaring bankruptcy; and **inner changes**, spiritual awakening, changing of inner thoughts and outward actions.

Bridges names three things in the process of transition: endings, the neutral zone and the new beginning. No matter what we go through there is an ending and a new beginning. What we often try to skip is the neutral zone because it is lonely and bland.

We try to jump too quickly to a new beginning without understanding what we have been through and give ourselves time to let go. When we hold on to the past we are not living in the present. Letting ourselves just “be” for awhile, and living in the moment, will let us heal, let us celebrate and let us prepare for that new beginning.

Does that make sense to you? It certainly gave me hope that I did not have to prepare a new beginning until I was ready. It gave me hope of healing. It has given me time to celebrate the wonder of an ending before I start a new beginning.

“Endings and beginnings, with emptiness and germination in between – that basic shape is so essential to growth that we must learn to recognize it in our lives,” Bridges writes.

I hope you will find this helpful to live in the moment as we all go through each of these processes of change. Change happens so fast, yet we can deal with it better if we are aware of our own inner self.

Just before his first birthday, Jonah became the youngest child in Ohio history to have double cochlear implants which have given him an amazing opportunity to hear and speak. Both Meredith and Mark are attorneys who have used their legal skills, coupled with their amazing faith, to bring sound and life to Jonah!

Another of our red-headed resurrection stories is Alex Heer. Alex is now 13, but on Nov. 30, 2000, at 4½ years old, Alex was diagnosed with a form of leukemia.

Brother of Susie and the youngest child of Bill and Holly Heer, Alex went through a long series of treatments. In the end he was cancer free. Some may remember him as a theatrical star in our Christmas play a few years back. He also serves as an acolyte for our worship at 11 a.m. Alex continues to shine God's light! He is another real life resurrection story in our faith community!

As we prepare for the celebration of the resurrection, let us remember that resurrections from death to life, from insurmountable odds against survival, have been happening in our community of faith. Grace, Jonah and Alex are our vanguards of hope.

Each of us has a story of real life resurrection that has touched our lives. Let's share those stories as we worship and serve together at First Church!

First Church Adapting to Staff Changes

With the departure of Rev. Lori Tisher in early February, staff and lay leaders are splitting up job assignments and preparing for the future. We are sorting out the needs of the congregation and our ability to serve you with fewer resources coupled with growing needs in our church family.

A plan for pastoral care and programming for all ages is being written. The plan will go to the Personnel Committee, the Executive Committee and then to the Church Council. Our intention is to have this plan before Council by late April at the soonest.

In March, the Music Minister Search Committee is conducting interviews and auditions with our three finalists for the position. This stage of the process is delicate and we ask for your prayers.

Our candidate will be selected and presented to the Church Council for their assessment and approval. The soonest this could happen is late March. On this schedule, our next music minister would probably arrive sometime after Easter, more likely in June or early summer.

Our interim music minister is Marti Rideout (ext. 14); Rev. Barb Cunningham is our minister of pastoral care, serving 3/4 time through 2009 (ext. 21, Stephen Ministers, deacons); Marty Worth is our program manager (ext. 12, bulletin, Good Samaritan Assistance, music program, flowers).

Otto Edwards is our security officer; our evening and weekend custodians are Frank Wall, Don Bell, Kelvin Murphy and William Lee; and nursery workers are Kelsey Weber, Jessica Yeager and Caroline Sansbury. There are no student interns this year.

Trustees Looking to Committees for Advice

The trustees are exploring the idea of creating three committees to assist them in addressing various responsibilities that are set forth in the church's constitution.

One of those responsibilities is to "ensure that adequate insurance for the church and its activities and property is maintained at all times." Another responsibility is to "actively encourage members of the church to contribute to the endowment funds and to make special gifts." Finally, the "trustees shall invest funds . . . held by them" arising from these contributions and from "other funds as requested by council."

The trustees would like to consider involving more members of the church who have expertise, skills, or experience in any of the three areas outlined above. Both trustees and non-trustees would serve on these committees. They would be empowered to study matters relevant to their respective areas of concentration and to make recommendations to the entire board of elected trustees.

One committee might be the "risk management committee" that could focus, for example, on examining potential liability issues that the church might face; reviewing periodically the value of church property and its contents; or identifying possible steps to take to reduce the risk of future losses or minimize future maintenance risks.

The next committee might be called the "financial development committee" that could focus, for example, on providing educational seminars on planned giving and estate planning; or examining the use of charitable gift annuities, life insurance, or retirement assets as ways to donate to the church's endowment funds or to make special gifts.

The third committee might be called the "investment strategy committee" that could focus, for example, on analyzing different investment strategies that might be relevant at different times resulting from an ever changing economic environment; evaluating the performance of different asset managers; or studying "best practices" by charitable organizations with respect to the management of their investments.

All the areas mentioned above are discussed in varying degrees of frequency and breadth by your current trustees. However, the trustees are looking for viable ways to involve more of the talent that is in our congregation with regard to these three different areas.

Are the committee suggestions described above an appropriate way to proceed? Are there other or better ways that the trustees should examine? Do you have an interest in exploring your possible involvement in this process?

Please contact any of the trustees if you would like to share your thoughts and ideas with us. The current trustees are: Patty Pohlman, Wally Giffen, Joyce Canfield, Matt Lazar, Randy Hoffman, Melody Leidheiser, and Phil Stichter (chair). Advisors to the trustees include Bill Johannes (treasurer), Mark Knueve (legal counsel) and our senior minister, Tim Ahrens.

Children Lenten Project Focuses on Hunger and Earth

Throughout Lent, the children will lead a church-wide mission project to raise money for Heifer International. This non-profit humanitarian organization is dedicated to ending world hunger and caring for the earth by providing livestock, trees, training and other resources to help struggling families around the globe.

Since 1944, Heifer has helped 9.2 million families in more than 125 countries move toward greater self-reliance through the gift of livestock and training in environmentally-sound agriculture. The impact of each initial gift is multiplied as recipients agree to pass on the gift by giving one or more of their animal's offspring, or the equivalent, to another in need.

All the children watched the Heifer video in the Children's Library during Education Hour and learned about the project on Sunday, March 1. Butterflies Teach about Resurrection

The Children's Education Ministry uses the life cycle of the Painted Lady butterfly to illustrate the concept of resurrection. This year, we will be able to return to our tradition of releasing butterflies Easter Sunday after the 11 a.m. service.



The "baby butterflies" arrive as larvae about three weeks prior to Easter. They must quickly be put into individual cups with the food that sustains them through this part of their life cycle. We watch them grow and grow and grow until the worms look too big for the cups.

Within two weeks, the worm attaches itself to the lid of the cup and forms a chrysalis. They hang there for another week looking lifeless. There is no movement or visible

Summer Camps Available for All

If the Outdoor Ministries summer camp catalog has arrived, can spring be far behind? Everyone is ready to plan some fun in the sun and that's just what camp is. The campers enjoy swimming, hiking, crafts, games, singing and worship. They have camp fires, vespers, rest time, and make friends that last a lifetime. They learn and grow in their faith.

There are camps for kindergarten and first-graders with a grandparent. Weeklong camps are for children who have completed the second grade and older. There are camps for teens and camps with themes. There are camps for adults, and even one for families.

First Congregational Church has always been a strong supporter of the Outdoor Ministries Summer Camp Program by encouraging participation and by offering scholarships for campers. Due to the increase in camp registration fee this year, First Church will offer additional scholarships for those families who need extra help. Any child who wants to go to camp should not be prevented from attending because of financial concerns.

There are extra camp catalogs in the office, or you can get one from Mark S. Williams. The deadline for early registration is March 31.

change. During this phase, the chrysalises are transferred to a net pavilion. On occasion we have been lucky enough to observe the butterflies emerging from the chrysalis.

It takes about two hours for the butterflies to pump blood to their wings and for them to dry and harden after they emerge. At this point, they can fly, and flit around the pavilion looking for something to eat. We feed them with sugar water placed on flowers inside their net pavilion. Their total life cycle is two to four weeks, depending on the temperature of their environment.

The children are fascinated with this very visible lesson in "resurrection" – something looking dead and hopeless – transforming into beautiful new life.

Art Committee

Responsible for all of First Church's aesthetic decisions, this committee weighs in on such things as paint colors, fabric choices, fixtures and signage, additions or alterations to existing features, art restoration and preservation of artifacts. There is an attempt at present to draft a document which states the Committee's mission and presents guidelines to follow by those who are overseeing projects around the building.

Allen Baker, interior designer and Committee member, is handling the details. Other committee members serving are: Peggy Alexander, Debbie Anderson, Chairman Anne Hudson, Rick Sayre, Gleva Stephens, Becky Taft, and Kendra Worley.

Remembrance Committee

After a several-year hiatus, at the behest of Trustees Chairman Philip Stichter this Committee was re-established under the chairmanship of Sarah Garbe. Serving with her are: Bev Cook, Kay Metz, Rick Sayre, Valerie Stichter and Larry Walquist.

The monies of the Remembrance Fund are invested by First Church's Trustees, but disbursements are made at the discretion of the committee. Traditionally, the Remembrance Fund has been a source for non-budgeted items of an aesthetic or commemorative nature or meant to enhance the worship experience at First Church.

The Archives

Archivist James Griffin's lofty intentions have been severely hampered by a shortage of funds. His hope of consulting with a professional preservationist has had to be set aside for lack of consulting fees. The small budget barely allows for the annual binding of all the newsletters and Orders of Worship which become part of First Church's permanent record. The Archives have once again been moved to the small room adjacent to the Parish Hall

mezzanine. Most of Washington Gladden's fifty-two books are there, plus member records from the church's founding, and countless assortments of documents, programs, pictures, and annual reports. The vast majority of First Church's memorabilia was deposited with the Ohio Historical Society years ago.

First Church Arts Festival Committee

With the June 6-8, 2008, Columbus Arts Festival's relocation into the Discovery District, First Church took advantage of its own proximity by offering a wide range of opportunities for Festival visitors. A Liturgical Art Guild Traveling Collection exhibit was mounted in the Parish Hall. (A nailfree mounting system underwritten by Art Committee member Becky Taft allowed numerous pieces to be displayed with no damage to paint or walls.) Also in the Parish Hall a "Chair-A-Tea" featured boutique-themed bentwood chairs for sale plus a lovely Tea Room hosted by the Missions Commission. Varieties of iced teas and light refreshments were served. Proceeds benefited Doctors Without Borders.

Four half-hour organ concerts were performed at various times by Julia Richardson Parker, G. Dene Barnard (2), and James D. Hildreth. Arts and History Docent Tours were available after each concert. A Choral Festival on Friday at 7 p.m. included the Columbus Children's Choir, Capriccio, Dublin Singers, Columbus Women's Chorus, and the First Church Choir. The finale was a Congolese mass—Missa Luba. Sheena Phillips was director. The Ohio Capital Winds under the direction of First Church member, Catherine Hope-Cunningham, performed on Saturday evening at 7 p.m. The final concert of the weekend on Sunday at 2 p.m. was by The Magpie Consort under the direction of Sheena Phillips.

Picture post cards, docent brochures, and an elevated wheel with flying streamers to call attention to our Ninth Street door were additional features.

First Church welcomed over 1,100 visitors and musical guests during the 2008 Columbus Arts Festival. Our events raised over \$1,580 for Doctors Without Borders and over \$1,400 to defray our costs.

the directory.” In other words, each person who is a member of First Church – either active or inactive – is held my prayers. You are in my heart.

Paraphrasing the Psalmist, I ask, “How do we sing the Lord’s song in a time such as this?” Let me offer three simple steps:

First, pray through the Psalms. Beginning at Psalm 1, read aloud all 150 Psalms. Take the next 150 days, starting today, and pray through the Psalms. The Psalms are the cries of the people to God. The Psalms are the people of God in prayer. They are laments, confessions, praises, weeping and joyful exaltations. The Psalms reflect our human experience.

At the end of each reading, lift to God in prayer the condition of your heart. Where are you that morning or evening? Share this with God either silently or aloud. End each time of prayer by slowly speaking aloud the Lord’s Prayer. When your 150 days have ended, begin again. In the August newsletter, I will also recommend the next sequence of scriptural readings for prayer!

Second, take time to write in a daily journal how it is with your soul. How are you coping with the stresses and strains of your life? How are you handling these economically depressing times? It is easy to become cynical and negative as you pass through these times. I encourage also to reflect on the “good news” of your life. Where is God touching your life right now? God touches us through the rising of the crocuses, the phone calls of friends and the kindness of a stranger. God smiles at us through the love in a child’s eyes and the song of the robin in early spring. Listen, pay attention and open yourself to God’s presence in your life. Record these experiences. You will be blown away by how many times each day, good things are happening in your walk with Christ.

Third, phone a friend! Part of the struggle we face in our daily lives is the feeling of aloneness and emptiness. If you want to be a millionaire, you have “phone a friend.” Pick up the phone and call someone. Call and talk with one other person. If you can’t think of anyone to call, call me 228-1741, ext. 13, or call Rev. Cunningham, 228-1741, ext. 21. We are here to listen and be present to you. Find another person with whom to share your insights from prayer and journaling.

Praying the Psalms, journaling and phoning a friend are steps to finding praise in your heart and soul.

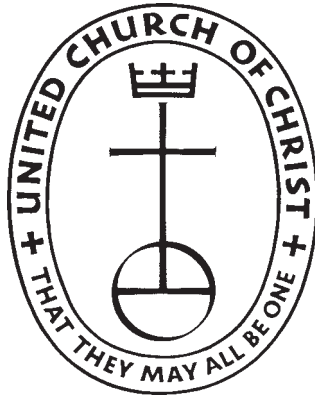

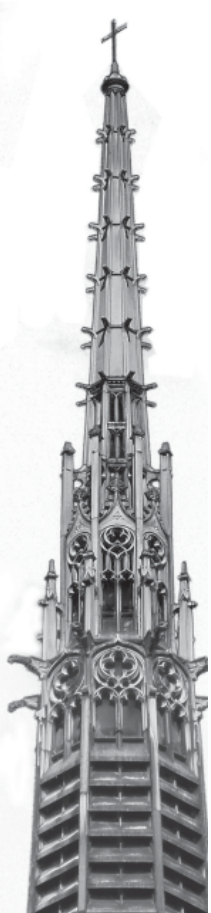
