Frances Madden, director at the Grace and Staff Foundation, says a steady stream of North American professionals come to their door wanting to learn about the community in order to write a book. These people are there not to help the community, but to complete their own projects.

Residents have expressed their fatigue about the constant “foreign” who come and go and do nothing to help the community.

CATALYST is a mission relationship. Don’t call us a “project.” When we first came into the community in 1997, we asked residents, “How can we work with you?” They responded, “Help us educate our children.” We sought out a local respected partner, Grace and Staff, and made a commitment to develop long-term relationships.

beyond that. Our CATALYST students have learned to be strategic in crafting their futures. They are finding mentors, setting goals and teaching the younger students! Wow!

4 Young People at Deep Griha Supported by First Church

Most First Church members are aware of the longstanding connection between our church and Deep Griha in Pune, India. Through our periodic mission offerings, certain joint ventures with First Community and Dublin Community churches, and the visits from Neela and Baskar Onawale, many of us have come to know much of the excellent work carried out by the "lighthouse" in Pune.

What some may not know is that for the past three years, members of First Church have sponsored four students at the **Aadhar Kendra Sponsorship Programme** (City of Child), a residential facility located in the country beyond Pune. Here, students whose families lack the basic needs of food, family, clothing and shelter can find a safe haven where they can feel comfortable and loved. They also get an outstanding education and medical care.

The cost to sponsor each child is \$220 annually. We took one offering in February, which yielded slightly over \$500. On May 8, a second offering was solicited, and brought in approximately \$475. This is wonderful news because it will allow us to continue our commitment to these four young people for another year.

Our children are three boys, Hrithik Mhetre, 12, Nadeem Nadaf, 16, and Suraj Mhamane, 19, and one girl, Mamta Bajantri, 13. Check them out on the Missions Board in June. I am sure each of them joins me in extending a very warm and profound "thank you" to all the members of First Church.

Annual Gathering Registration Opens

Registration is under way for this year's Annual Gathering of the Ohio Conference of the United Church of Christ at Heidelberg University in Tiffin, Ohio, on June 10 and 11. The registration deadline is May 25.

The keynote speaker will be the Rev. Tony Robinson, an ordained UCC minister, who has served four congregations. His present ministry is a multi-faceted one. He travels throughout North America as a speaker, teacher, preacher, consultant and coach serving congregations and their leaders. He has taught at

What in the World is ‘OCWM?’

Every annual budget time, as well as on several Sundays a year, we hear about “OCWM giving.” Our Church’s Wider Mission (OCWM) offerings go to the Central Southeast Ohio Association of the Ohio Conference of the United Church of Christ for support of a variety of missions and services provided by association, conference and national levels of the UCC. We used to give 10% of our annual member pledge receipts. Now it is closer to 6%! Shame on us.

The portion of OCWM funds allocated to the Central Southeast Ohio Association include:

- Facilitates and encourages the discernment process of 20+ persons called to authorized ministry
- Nurtures 110 active and retired authorized ministers
- Coordinates the involvement of association churches with Iglesia Mission Christiana, our partner church Association in Nicaragua
- Builds vitality to 39 local churches in times of transition or conflict
- Nurtures the development of new UCC congregations
- Engages Association members and congregations in opportunities for social justice witness and advocacy
- Builds ecumenical relationships with other denominations especially the Disciples of Christ
- Creates and implements quality programming for youth including camps
- Fosters coordinated and efficient solutions to common church dilemmas

At the state and national levels OCWM, allocations go to wider missions such as:

- The church’s Executive Council
- The Office of General Ministries
- Justice and Witness Ministries
- Local church ministry support
- Wider church ministry support
- The General Assembly
- Pension boards
- Coordinating response to natural disasters and feeding the hungry

Suffer the Children

I have always thought that the translation “suffer the children” is one of the worst bumbles of the King James Version of the Bible. Granted English of that time had another nuance for “suffer,” but nevertheless many churches have been “suffering the children” ever since.

First Church is not one of the “suffering the children” churches. Children are welcomed at both services, serve communion at the 9 a.m. service, participate as choir members and acolytes at 11 a.m., joyously disrupt our solemnity with hushed questions and giggles and take part in a variety of activities, including the Christmas play and pageant. One of my fondest memories is of an Academy Award-winning sheep at the 2009 Christmas play.



When I first took on entering contributions into First Church’s financial computer program under the gracious and detailed guidance of Natalie Wright, one of my first puzzlements was #68 Mission Sundays. Having nothing to do with the weekly mission offering of the church, Mission Sundays is the computer category under which children’s offerings in the church school are recorded. These contributions were recorded anonymously for the most part. I noticed that some children (or their parents or church school teachers) recorded their names on Mission Sunday envelopes. I began recording their contributions by name in the church’s computer financial program.

Our church’s children’s stewardship education took a little step forward. The intention was to have the children and youth receive contribution statements just like the adults. With Mark Williams’ illness- enforced absence, the transitions in the church school, increased participation in the 9 a.m. service, the stewardship of our children and youth once again fell into anonymity.

Mark is back. Mission Sunday envelopes are being recycled and prepared for use. September Celebration Day will mark the beginning of Mission Sunday envelopes for all our children and youth. Parents are encouraged to talk with their children and teens about giving to the church. Encourage children and teens to write their names on the envelopes. Last names will help, but we’ll figure out who the first name only ones are. They are important stewards now and in the future.

As a kid in Brooklyn I remember putting my quarter in the envelope each Sunday. And I also remember receiving the handwritten record from the church treasurer. That helped lay the foundation for my life-long stewardship in churches and the world.

New Sister Congregations Formed in Our Association

First Congregational Church is a member of the Central Southeast Ohio Association (CSEOA) of the Ohio Conference of the United Church of Christ. In the bottom-up structure of congregational polity (where the congregation is king) it is the association that nurtures and ordains clergy and admits and nurtures new congregations. With two new additions, our local association now has 38 member churches.

At the 48th spring annual meeting of the CSEOA on May 7 at Advent UCC in Columbus, two new Columbus church starts were officially admitted to full standing: New Song UCC, pastured by the Rev. Yvonne Gilmore-Essig, and Oasis UCC, led by the Rev. Deb Click. New Song meets mostly on Thursday evenings and features jazz and gospel choir music. Their fantastic jazz group, the New Song Trio, was featured at the spring gathering. Oasis meets on Sunday evenings at the home of Deb Click. Their non-traditional approach to study and worship is pitched to people who have been turned off by bad experiences with “traditional” congregations. Their focus is book and Bible studies that try to find answers to diverse questions of attendees regarding faith and practice.

A third new congregation near Charleston, W. Va., currently is in formation and is called Bridges of Grace UCC with Rev Kay Albright as pastor. They are responding to the need for an open and affirming congregation in that part of the country.

Officials Commit to BREAD Initiative to 'STOP Wasting Money and Lives'

Over 2,900 people filled Veterans's Memorial on May 2 for BREAD's annual Nehemiah Action. Public officials responded to the call to "STOP Wasting Money and STOP Wasting Lives" by committing to support BREAD initiatives dealing with crime, education, health care and neighborhood blight.



Municipal Court Judge Paul Herbert accepted BREAD's plan to conduct pre-sentence screening for the 30,000 criminal cases seen in court every year to help judges give the most appropriate sentences to offenders.

County Prosecutor Ron O'Brien and Public Defender Yeura Venters plan to reduce the incarceration of juveniles by better addressing the risks and needs of the offenders.

Health care in Franklin County also was on the agenda. Steve Wermuth of the Ohio Health Department promised to work with hospitals to reduce the use of emergency rooms by the chronically ill and to provide care for the uninsured and Medicare patients.

Once again, BREAD asked Superintendent Gene Harris of Columbus City Schools to expand Project Key, which has had tremendous success in reducing truancy in 10 middle schools. She agreed to double the district's investment in the program.

The final issue raised was the continuing campaign for the implementation of the County Land Reutilization Corporation. County Treasurer Ed Leonard has been working on CLRC for two years and hopes to have a Land Bank established by November.

From house meetings held in congregations last fall to the great assembly at Vets, the witness of 88 people representing First Congregational had a great impact on Franklin County officials. Their positive response and our commitment to support and monitor the implementation of these initiatives will ensure that we "STOP Wasting Money and STOP Wasting Lives!"
