## God's Worshiping People

First, let me say something out loud that I hope everyone already knows: We love to have children in worship at both the 9 and 11 o'clock services! They bring us joy in their smiles, their bouncing, and their learning how to whisper. They take us back in our lives helping us remember who first taught us about God's love. And for those who were not in church until adulthood, children offer the opportunity to find ways to extend our faith to the not-yet-adult-ones.



Children also call us to remember the wisdom of our loving God who delivered the Christ to the world as a baby instead of as a grownup. How blessed we are at First Church to have all ages and stages worshipping together. We also enjoy providing a special time for younger children and families to worship apart on occasion and learn from others. We've renamed this special opportunity, "Worship Connections".



Worship Connections takes place following the Children's Time in the 11 o'clock worship. They meet in the preschool classroom, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, across the hall from the Children's Library. Worship Connections is geared primarily

for kindergarten through fifth grader (elementary age). Childcare is always available for the younger ones in the education wing 1<sup>st</sup> floor. (This helps the lesson planners with matching skill set activities; however, we never turn the younger ones away if they want to be in the group.)

We encourage the Middle School and High School youth to remain in worship with their families, each other, or with their youth and Sunday school teachers unless they have signed up to be helpers in Worship Connections. Teens are also encouraged to participate leading worship as acolytes, readers and greeters.

In Worship Connections the teachers continue the lectionary lesson of the day – the same lesson being preached and experienced in the sanctuary. We encourage parents and grandparents to talk about worship on the way home. Tell them what you heard in the sermon and how you felt during your time of worship. Invite them to do the same. The opportunities to expand faith in families begin one small conversation at a time.

In addition to the scripture lesson, Worship Connection leaders also teach worship skills including - prayer, call to worship, communion and baptism. We encourage you to be at ease as you do the same thing in worship with them. (It's a fun adventure to help them hold the Bible or hymnal while you guide their eyes across the words. It's even ok if it crashes to the floor every now and then!)

Each of us have the opportunity to keep our baptismal promises and intentionally pass along our faith to the next generation – in worship, in the halls, in classrooms and in fellowship time. *We are the community of faith and we need each other.*

I hope you will also prayerfully consider volunteering to serve as a leader or helper in Worship Connections – not every week, maybe for one or two Sundays a year. You will be surprised how easy and rewarding it is. We work in pairs, so you will always have a helper. All materials are prepared ahead of time for you. Men, women and teens are all welcome and encouraged to sign up to participate in this fun ministry. All you need to do is bring your joy and let the kids increase it for you!

## A Letter From Deep Griha Founder

*This is a letter from Neela Onawale of Deep Griha in India, talking about her life since her husband's death in the spring.*

Dear Friends in Columbus (First Community Church and First Congregational Church):



My last week of April and the first week of May 2010 was as if I was caught in a whirlwind!! The whirlwind distorted everything around me, caused deep hurt, caused great damage and loss and left me in a state of shock and confusion for some time.

It was a challenge to my faith. It was hard to accept this as God's plan but then he assured me over a period of time that Bhaskar had run the race, had accomplished the tasks set aside for him, had finished the race and that from now on, the Lord is with me for the rest of my life, to hold my hand, guide me to fulfill his plans in my life and help me finish my race.

It took a while to get used to be alone on this road. During this phase of sudden sadness, shock, confusion I received many phone calls, letters, cards, e-cards, emails, ensuring me of the love and support through prayers of loved ones. This love and support enabled me to wait upon the Lord and He has renewed my strength so that I can mount up with wings as eagles, I will run and not be weary I will walk but not faint, for he is there to hold me and guide me.

I was overwhelmed with the love that was poured on me and my dear ones during this time of trial. I cannot thank everyone individually but just pray to the Lord to bless each one of them.

I watched the 13 June memorial service (at First Community) for Bhaskar live on the computer screen. It did touch me, but I did not get the full essence, since I had very mixed feelings while watching it live and I had tears rolling down, something was churning inside of me! I wished to hug each one present there on the screen!

After I received the quilt and the DVD, (which I watched over and over again. Thanks, Randy), I was deeply moved by the whole ambience, the music, the singing, the words of the sermon and the words of the tribute for Bhaskar said from the heart. Thanks Dick, Deborah, Jim, the choir and everyone present for the service to make it so special for me.

The prayer quilt is beautiful. It elevated my spirits, I am happy to own this beautiful gesture of love and care and yes, it will keep me reminded of the love of each one of you always and will keep me warm. I read the names of those who signed the prayer quilt booklet several times. I am sure there would have been some who wished but could not attend the service and sign on that booklet and could not tie a knot but did say a prayer for me. As a proud owner of this prayer quilt I am showing it around to family and friends. I distributed copies of DVDs to the dear ones here.

The Bhaskar Memorial Fund was received with all humility and a deeply thankful heart. I do not have words to thank you all for the generous support and especially the love behind it.

I am very sorry it has taken me so very long to respond to all these lovely gestures of love but I am sure you will understand. Thanks again for being there for me. Love you all.

## Congregational Concerts



### October 24, 4 p.m.

Congregational Concerts continue with special emphasis on music of Bach. Harpsichordist Aya Hamada plays a recital on our Bechtel harpsichord, concluding with a Bach concerto for two harpsichords and strings. I join her for that work with my own von Nagel harpsichord.

### November 21, 4 p.m.

The First Church Choral Society offers a Bach Festival. The themes of thanksgiving and praise are abundant in the festive Reformation Cantata *Gott, der Herr, ist Sonn' und Schild* (God, the Lord is sun and shield), BWV 79 with strings, oboes, trumpets and timpani.

A select chamber choir will perform Cantata *Herz and Mund and Tat und Leben*, BWV 147. Each cantata contains a famous chorale setting: *Now thank we all our God* in BWV 79, and the movement known in English as *Jesu, joy of man's desiring* in BWV 147. Pre-concert talk at 3:40 p.m.

### December 19, 4 p.m.

## Festival of Lessons and Carols

That glorious song of old is sung once more in the radiance of candlelight with this traditional service of scripture, carols and congregational song. Join First Church choirs, ringers and organs for this highlight of the Christmas season. Prelude begins at 3:30 p.m.

## Tuesdays at First

Our midday Tuesdays at First concert series for the fall will conclude October 26 with an organ recital by Organist Choirmaster Emeritus, G. Dene Barnard. The half-hour recital at 12:15 p.m. is followed by homemade lunch (\$5 donation). A book study is offered before the recital at 11 a.m. and examines Jim Wallis's latest book, *Rediscovering Values* (on Wall Street, Main Street and Your Street).

## Compline

Plan to join us for the evening service of Compline, offered the third Sunday of each month, except on Congregational Concert days, at 9 p.m. This 30-minute service of unaccompanied plainsong chant is illuminated by candlelight. It is a beautiful, peaceful, prayerful way to end the Lord's Day. Compline at First Church will be January 16, February 20, March 20, April 17 and May 15.

caught my eye most of all was a painting of sunflowers I had not seen in many years. "The Sunflowers" were a gift given by the staff of the Columbus Museum of Art in memory of Jennifer M. Keefer.

Jen Keefer was only 33 when cancer claimed her life. Like the sunflower, Jen was bursting with life, light and love when she died in 2003. She left behind husband Tony and two young children Ellie and Hank. I baptized Jennifer and I still remember her dancing down the aisle in a bright red dress on her baptismal day. She could light up a room like few others I have known. When she died, we were left only with memories and this beautiful gift of sunflowers.

In Spain, in late June, we would drive for miles and miles through countryside covered with sunflowers. Whole fields of yellow turned their broad faces to the sun in adoration. What a sight to see nothing but the yellow delight filling the landscapes east and west. Tall and strong, the sunflowers seemed to worship the light which gave them daily strength and vibrancy.

In this new season of life at First Church, the sunflowers have returned in full bloom in our youth room. With the return of the sunflowers, Jen's light returns as well. I am reminded that is God's time and in God's creation, everything has a season and time and place under heaven.

In this glorious season of turning and returning, may God's light shine in and through you to others. And may our God's light guide our steps into unity and love through Christ Jesus our Savior.

A new 60-second video message from the United Church of Christ will help kick-off the Stillspeaking Ministry's National Friend-Raising weekend November 5-7.

"We will launch our next video ad on Friday, November 5, with the help of members and friends who will share it with millions across the Internet," said the Rev. Felix Carrion, coordinator of the UCC's Stillspeaking Ministry. "As we learned earlier this year, our best broadcasting arsenal is our members' enthusiasm to advance our messages forward via social networking."

The new commercial will be the centerpiece of a special "friend-raising" emphasis November 7. Members are asked to be intentional about inviting others to join them at church services that day.



"We are asking churches to promote Nov. 7 as

Stillspeaking Friend-Raising Sunday, a day set aside to be intentional about inviting our family, friends and neighbors to come to church with us," Carrion said.

After services November 7, all UCC churches will be invited to record their visitor tally online at <http://www.ucc.org/god-is-still-speaking/friendraising.html>. On November 9, a national count of visitors will be announced in the UCC's weekly Keeping You e-Posted e-newsletter.

The congregations with the most visitors overall and most visitors per capita of membership will receive a new God is Still Speaking banner and a supply of red lapel pins and copies of the inaugural issues of the StillSpeaking Magazine for every member of the congregation. Carrion is also offering to visit the winning churches to say thank you in person.

"We want to underscore the primary goal of the Stillspeaking Ministry, which is to grow the United Church of Christ in visibility, yes, but also numerically," Carrion said. "This will be a day to let our UCC light shine."

### Here's how to enroll (re-enrollment starts at step 3):

1. Enter **customer.kroger.com** into your web browser.
2. If you do not already have an online account, then click "**Get started Sign up today**" (at the bottom right). **Enter your email address** and **create a password**, follow the on-line instructions and options. Kroger will send you an email message, to activate your account **click on the link in the message** or cut and paste the address into your browser.
3. Once you have an activated online account, go back to **customer.kroger.com** (or **krogercommunityrewards.com**) to sign in.
4. Select **My Account/Account Settings**, select **Community Rewards**, and select **Edit Community Rewards Information**.
5. Find your organization by entering your organization's name or NPO number (**#84966-First Congregational Church** or **#81813-First Church Choir**), then click "**Search**."

6. Be sure to click on the circle to the left of your organization so that it becomes highlighted. Click "**Select Your Organization**".
7. Click "**Save Changes**".

## 'A Taste of Jamaica' to Help CATALYST Students

"A Taste of Jamaica" will be held in the Parish Hall after each worship service this Sunday, October 24, to benefit the CATALYST program.

For \$5 you will get: 2 pieces of Jerk Chicken (not too spicy); rice and peas ( a Jamaican staple, we will use brown rice and the "peas" are actually small kidney beans); and Jamaican lunch vegetables (cabbage, carrots and onions)

The lunches will be sold "to go," so whether you attend the 9 or 11 a.m. service, you will be able to enjoy! Please sign up in the church office if you are interested in buying a lunch so we will have an idea of how much to prepare.

CATALYST is a mission relationship between the First Congregational Church and the people of the garrison communities of Kingston, Jamaica, and the Grace and Staff Community Development Foundation. CATALYST serves the many exceptional secondary and college students found in these violent and impoverished areas.

CATALYST is the designated offering this Sunday. We need to raise \$2,570 by the end of the 2010.

What our students need money for:

\* **Secondary Scholarships** Eighteen of our CATALYST students are still in secondary school and require assistance with school fees. \$75 per scholarship for 18 students totals \$1,350.

\***SAT/PSAT guides** Twelve of our CATALYST students, as well as many of the other students, will need an SAT or PSAT guide. One guide will be used by numerous students. 6 SAT/PSAT guides at about \$20, online plus shipping, totals \$240.

\***SAT and PSAT Test Fees** Twelve CATALYST students will be taking the SAT and PSAT. That's \$40 for 12 students at a cost of \$480.

\* **Study Guides** Our college students need help with their subjects, especially chemistry, differential equations and psychics. We will use Schaum's or Barron's study guides on these and other subjects. The cost is \$250.

\* **Books and food** Our college students in Jamaica are

having difficulty getting money for books and food. Most students are using the textbooks in a library, sharing or going without. Many of our students only have one meal a day at lunch. If they don't eat at school, they don't eat at all! While there are programs to feed younger children, nothing exists to help those in college. Lunch costs about \$3 per day. The total is \$250.

## Sacred Earth Rummage Sale Raises \$1,200 for Green Effort



On September 18, the Sacred Earth Committee held a rummage sale and turned your unused "stuff" into \$1,200. These funds were contributed to the capital campaign, designated for repairs and improvements to our existing church home.

Sacred Earth was founded to raise ecological awareness, as well as financial support for the "greening of First Church." The committee's fundraising thus far has replaced ballasts in church lighting to improve both output and cost. Our contribution to the capital campaign will continue such efforts to improve energy usage throughout our buildings.

The Sacred Earth Committee thanks all who contributed merchandise to the sale. We especially appreciate the contributions of time and talent of those who helped with the collection, pricing, setup and cleanup. We look forward to a bigger and better sale in our future.

## Book Study Looks at Bonhoeffer

A new Wednesday morning book study has begun, with a discussion of *Bonhoeffer: Pastor, Prophet, Martyr, Spy* by Eric Metaxas. It is led by the Rev. Timothy C. Ahrens at 11 a.m. on the first and third Wednesday of each month.

Metaxas writes a thorough biography of Dietrich Bonhoeffer, one of the most fascinating Christians of the 20th century. Bonhoeffer was all that Metaxas says in the title and so much more. He was a seminary professor, a profound author and Biblical scholar, and one of the most insightful men living in the maelstrom of international conflict of our last century.

The names of Martin Luther King Jr. and Dietrich Bonhoeffer should be familiar to Christians living in our time. Bonhoeffer once wrote, "Silence in the face of evil is evil itself: God will not hold us guiltless. Not to speak is to speak. Not to act is to act." This class will prove to be one of our best as we gather to consider our words and actions based on the Gospel and our teacher, Dietrich Bonhoeffer.
