The Third Sunday in Lent

WELCOME TO FIRST CHURCH!

If you are visiting today and looking for a church home, welcome! *For more than 169 years our Covenant has been: We covenant with the Lord Jesus Christ and one another, and bind ourselves in the presence of God to live together in all God's ways as revealed to us by the Holy Spirit and holy scripture. The church acknowledges that all members have the right of individual interpretation of the principles of the Christian faith and respects them in their honest convictions. In accordance with the teaching of our Lord, the church recognizes two sacraments: Baptism and Holy Communion.*

The liturgy of Morning Prayer is a form of daily worship adapted through the ages that has its earliest roots in our Jewish heritage. Its premise is one of praying to God at the beginning of the day—giving thanks for another day ahead. The service falls roughly into three main parts: Opening sentences and singing/reading of the Psalms; readings from Holy Scripture - usually one from the Hebrew texts, and one from the Gospels - interspersed with ancient songs of the church; and prayers. To this we add Holy Communion, bringing further meaning to the totality of the prayers we have already offered. The liturgy presupposes full and hearty congregational involvement in the spoken and sung responses, preparing us to be sent forth from this house of worship into the wider world to live out the Great Commission.

CONFESSION OF SIN AND ASSURANCE OF PARDON



A reading from the Gospel according to Luke, chapter 13.

At that very time there were some present who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, “Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. New COVID-19 Guidelines on March 20

Throughout the pandemic, we have followed the recommendations of public health officials. With recent changes to the CDC, Franklin County, and City of Columbus guidelines, we at First Church will work to keep all in our community safe. With “low or moderate” risk levels, we will begin to move to mask-optional for the 11 a.m. service, concerts in the sanctuary, and weekday events at First Church.

The Task Force, Deacons, and Council still recommend mask wearing for those who are not vaccinated, or in a high-risk group. Again, if you are experiencing symptoms, coughing, sneezing, fever, or not feeling well, please do not come to church and instead join us for online worship.

Sunday Worship

9 a.m. Worship

No change to mask-wearing guidelines. Mask wearing will continue for this service, due to the size of space and number of young children not able to be vaccinated yet. We will continue to observe social distancing.

11 a.m. Worship

Beginning on March 20, First Church will have mask-optional for this worship service. We will remove the reserved pew ropes and allow individuals to spread out more. We ask that you observe social distancing as best you can and make use of the “reserve seat cards” if you still need more distance and space in the pew.

During the week at First Church:

Masking optional in the building.

Still call for an appointment.

Sign in and practice good hand hygiene.

Meetings may return to in-person with advanced notice to the office. At the discretion of the convener, groups may meet at the church. All meetings must be made in advance with the church office and be on the church calendar.

We understand that this decision will be met with a variety of emotions, including celebration, grief, relief, and anxiety. We want to be clear that it is OK to keep wearing masks. In fact, for some, it is the safest and best decision to continue to mask at church. You will see many staff and lay leaders and choir members continuing to wear masks! We encourage you to do what you need to do in order to feel safe and comfortable as we gather to worship God.

Lenten Studies with Rev. Ahrens

“Breath of Life: God as Spirit in Judaism”

Rev. Ahrens continues the Wednesday Book Study with a whole new book – beginning March 16 at 10:30 a.m. During his 2021 Sabbatical, Rev. Ahrens spent time with Rabbi Rachel Timoner. She is one the “Geniuses of Justice” in his new book. Here in Rabbi Timoner’s book, she explores the Hebrew Bible, Midrash, and other rabbinic writing to uncover surprising insights about how God as spirit influences Jewish ideas of creation, revelation, and redemption. Written with an accessible and engaging voice, full of stories and relevant teachings, Breath of Life speaks to lay readers and scholars alike, as it pursues a new perspective on Judaism’s sacred texts. This book promises Christian readers meaningful insights on their own notions of God as Holy Spirit while giving Jewish readers a new look at their own tradition.
