WELCOME TO FIRST CHURCH!

If you are visiting today and looking for a church home, welcome! *For more than 169 years our Covenant has been: We covenant with the Lord Jesus Christ and one another, and bind ourselves in the presence of God to live together in all God's ways as revealed to us by the Holy Spirit and holy scripture. The church acknowledges that all members have the right of individual interpretation of the principles of the Christian faith and respects them in their honest convictions. In accordance with the teaching of our Lord, the church recognizes two sacraments: Baptism and Holy Communion.*

The liturgy of Morning Prayer is a form of daily worship adapted through the ages that has its earliest roots in our Jewish heritage. Its premise is one of praying to God at the beginning of the day—giving thanks for another day ahead. The service falls roughly into three main parts: Opening sentences and singing/reading of the Psalms; readings from Holy Scripture - usually one from the Hebrew texts, and one from the Gospels - interspersed with ancient songs of the church; and prayers. To this we add Holy Communion, bringing further meaning to the totality of the prayers we have already offered. The liturgy presupposes full and hearty congregational involvement in the spoken and sung responses, preparing us to be sent forth from this house of worship into the wider world to live out the Great Commission.





Global Mission Partner : Xiomara Cintron-Garcia, Colombia

Xiomara Cintron-Garcia serves with the Christian Centre for Justice, Peace, and Nonviolent Action (Justapaz), in Bogota, Colombia. Justapaz is an organization of the Mennonite Christian Church of Colombia, which seeks to follow Jesus Christ from the Anabaptist perspective. Four principles provide guidance: (1) congruence with the Gospel of Peace by living out concern for the poor and victims (2) respecting others through good treatment, nonviolence, and justice (3) seeking the guidance of the Holy Spirit in their being and doing as an organization (4) practicing shalom spiritually, economically, politically, culturally, and environmentally. Ms. Cintron-Garcia serves in Justapaz’s area of Women and Peace to promote the inclusion of women from churches, communities, and socio-ecclesial organizations in the peace-building efforts so necessary in Colombia. Women and Peace also provide support for women’s political advocacy in rural territories and promote dialogues for reconciliation between diverse women victims of Colombia’s armed conflict. Among the many challenges facing Colombia, she notes corruption, economic instability, lack of opportunity, and a very strong patriarchal structure.
