WELCOME TO FIRST CHURCH!

If you are visiting today and looking for a church home, welcome! *For more than 170 years our Covenant has been: We covenant with the Lord Jesus Christ and one another, and bind ourselves in the presence of God to live together in all God's ways as revealed to us by the Holy Spirit and holy scripture. The church acknowledges that all members have the right of individual interpretation of the principles of the Christian faith and respects them in their honest convictions. In accordance with the teaching of our Lord, the church recognizes two sacraments: Baptism and Holy Communion.*

The liturgy of Morning Prayer is a form of daily worship adapted through the ages that has its earliest roots in our Jewish heritage. Its premise is one of praying to God at the beginning of the day—giving thanks for another day ahead. The service falls roughly into three main parts: Opening sentences and singing/reading of the Psalms; readings from Holy Scripture - usually one from the Hebrew texts, and one from the Gospels - interspersed with ancient songs of the church; and prayers. To this we add Holy Communion, bringing further meaning to the totality of the prayers we have already offered. The liturgy presupposes full and hearty congregational involvement in the spoken and sung responses, preparing us to be sent forth from this house of worship into the wider world to live out the Great Commission.

**Concerts at First Church presents

ISABELLE DEMERS, Organist
Sunday, October 9, 2022, 4 p.m.**

A native of Québec and a doctoral graduate of the Juilliard School, Dr. Demers is Associate Professor of Organ at McGill University (Montréal, Québec). She has appeared in recital throughout Europe, Oman, Australia, New Zealand, the United States, and Canada with reviews describing her playing as “bracing virtuosity...fearless and extraordinary.”

Dr. Demers is in continual high demand by her colleagues as witnessed by performances for numerous regional and national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Institute of Organ Builders and International Society of Organbuilders, the Royal Canadian College of Organists, and the Organ Historical Society.

She has released three CD recordings on the Acis and Pro Organo labels.

Isabelle Demers will perform on both of our organs at First Church, the first concert of the 2022-2023 season.

There are few churches in the country that boast two world-class, independent pipe organs under one roof. Our CHANCEL ORGAN, a 1931 W.W. Kimball out of Chicago Il, has four manuals (keyboards), 66 stops (different sounds like flutes, oboe, harp, trumpet piccolo, clarinet, celeste, cello, tuba, English horn, bourdon, diapason, trombone, viola, mixtures and many more), 66 ranks (sets of pipes, one pipe for each note of the keyboard in each set of pipes, a total of 4,407 pipes). Our GALLERY ORGAN, a 1972 Rudolf von Beckerath instrument from Hamburg, Germany, has three manuals, 47 stops, 73 ranks of pipes, with 3,719 pipes. The stops include principals, flutes, mixtures, trumpet, Spanish Trumpet, viola, cornet, oboe, cromorne, gedeckt, posaune, and mixtures, among others. The pipes range in size from that of a slim pencil to 32' in length.

Organists from all over the country are thrilled to be invited to perform on our extraordinary organs and many have done so in our fifty-one years of offering concerts at First Church.

Plan to attend this concert by Dr. Isabelle Demers. Invite your family, music-loving friends, and neighbors to come and experience an exciting performance on our truly magnificent instruments.

Anne Gregory, Thailand

Anne Gregory serves with the Church of Christ in Thailand (CCT), an association of Protestant Christian churches and ministries. Originally mainly Presbyterian, CCT churches are now about half Baptist, due to demographic shift. Some of the ministries of the member churches are development and support of hospitals, clinics, schools, colleges, and seminaries throughout the country. They have also worked to alleviate the effects of human trafficking and to develop cash crops to replace poppy growing. CCT played an active part in disaster response to the Tsunami at Christmastime in 2004.

Ms. Gregory works at the national offices of the CCT, helping the branches to communicate with each other and with partners in other countries. This includes helping to obtain visas for workers and visitors, gathering and disseminating information to supporters around the world, and helping visiting groups of Christians to tour the country. She promotes building support for the CCT’s ministries of justice, economic development, education, healthcare, social work, and spiritual development.
