The Second Sunday of Lent

WELCOME TO FIRST CHURCH!

If you are visiting today and looking for a church home, welcome! *For more than 170 years our Covenant has been: We covenant with the Lord Jesus Christ and one another, and bind ourselves in the presence of God to live together in all God's ways as revealed to us by the Holy Spirit and holy scripture. The church acknowledges that all members have the right of individual interpretation of the principles of the Christian faith and respects them in their honest convictions. In accordance with the teaching of our Lord, the church recognizes two sacraments: Baptism and Holy Communion.*

The liturgy of Morning Prayer is a form of daily worship adapted through the ages that has its earliest roots in our Jewish heritage. Its premise is one of praying to God at the beginning of the day—giving thanks for another day ahead. The service falls roughly into three main parts: Opening sentences and singing/reading of the Psalms; readings from Holy Scripture - usually one from the Hebrew texts, and one from the Gospels - interspersed with ancient songs of the church; and prayers. To this we add Holy Communion, bringing further meaning to the totality of the prayers we have already offered. The liturgy presupposes full and hearty congregational involvement in the spoken and sung responses, preparing us to be sent forth from this house of worship into the wider world to live out the Great Commission.

CONFESSION OF SIN AND ASSURANCE OF PARDON



Global Ministries

Jordan: Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees and the Orthodox Initiative

The Middle East Council of Churches is a fellowship of 27 member churches gathered in four families: Oriental Orthodox, Eastern Orthodox, Evangelical, and Catholic. Spanning the Middle East and North Africa from Algeria to Iran, 12 to 15 million Christians are thus represented in this all-inclusive Council. The Council has several units and programs, including the Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees (DSPR). Over 70,000 Palestinians benefit from the health clinics in DSPR areas of operation, particularly in Gaza and Jordan. DSPR also provides vocational training in such subjects as carpentry, metal and aluminum works, secretarial studies, English, dressmaking, hairdressing, and knitting. A long-time focus of DSPR has been the construction of cisterns in the many communities that have few or no dependable water sources.

The Orthodox Initiative was established in 2011 to strengthen the Christian community in the Middle East. The Initiative works in many different ways to realize its goal of a united Christian community throughout the Middle East and the world. This movement comes at a time of great threat to Middle Eastern Christians when emigration seems like the only hope of safety for their children. In the midst of such strife, the Initiative challenges families to reach out to one another for strength, to remain steadfast in their homelands, and to remind the rest of society that "we have equal rights, and we are here."

Eric Plutz is University Organist at Princeton University, where his responsibilities include playing for weekly services at the Chapel, Academic Ceremonies, and solo concerts, as well as accompanying the Chapel Choir in services and concerts. He coordinates the weekly After Noon Concert Series, is Lecturer in Music and Instructor of Organ at Princeton University, and maintains a private studio. He earned a Bachelor of Music degree from Westminster Choir College and a Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music. Additional study was in Paris and The Hague.

Eric has accompanied many organizations, including the Symphonic Choir at Westminster Choir College, the Bach Choir of Bethlehem, Choral Arts Society of Washington, the Cathedral Choral Society (DC).

Mr. Plutz has accepted concert engagements in distinguished locations across the United States and abroad, including Germany, Austria, Philadelphia, New York City, Washington, DC, and San Francisco. He has been a featured artist in Regional and National Conventions of the American Guild of Organists.

In celebration of Louis Vierne's 150th birthday in 2020, Eric initiated The Vierne Project, performances of the complete organ symphonies, which were released on CD in 2022. We are privileged to hear one of those symphonies during his concert at First Church.
