THE HEBREW SCRIPTURE LESSON

1 Samuel 3:1-10

Mr. Duncan

Leader: A reading from the First Book of Samuel, the third chapter.

THE EPISTLE LESSON 1 Corinthians 6:12-20 Mr. Duncan


