THE HEBREW SCRIPTURE LESSON

Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9

Charlie Knerr

Leader: A reading from the book of Deuteronomy, the fourth chapter.

Moses said: So now, Israel, give heed to the statutes and ordinances that I am teaching you to observe, so that you may live to enter and occupy the land that the Lord, the God of your ancestors, is giving you. You must neither add anything to what I command you nor take away anything from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God with which I am charging you.

You must observe them diligently, for this will show your wisdom and discernment to the peoples, who, when they hear all these statutes, will say, "Surely this great nation is a wise and discerning people!" For what other great nation has a god so near to it as the Lord our God is whenever we call to him? And what other great nation has statutes and ordinances as just as this entire law that I am setting before you today?

But take care and watch yourselves closely, so as neither to forget the things that your eyes have seen nor to let them slip from your mind all the days of your life; make them known to your children and your children's children.

THE GOSPEL

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

Rev. Ahrens

Leader: A reading from the Gospel according to Mark, the seventh chapter.

When the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, "Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?" He said to them, "Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

'This people honors me with their lips,
 but their hearts are far from me;
 in vain do they worship me,
 teaching human precepts as doctrines.'

You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition."

Then he called the crowd again and said to them, "Listen to me, all of you, and understand: there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile." For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person."

Come enjoy lively conversation and fellowship this September and October with the First Church Book Club.

On Wednesday, September 4, Mary Jacobson will lead a discussion of *Our Missing Hearts* by Celeste Ng. This is the story of the bond between a mother and child living in a fearful society.

Government overreach causes ordinary people to be jailed and children removed from their parents. Police violence, political protest, book banning, and discrimination thrive. What are the powers—and limitations—of words, of stories, of art, to create change in the world? What lessons and legacies do we pass on to our children? How do any of us survive a broken world with our hearts intact?

On Wednesday, October 2, Kathy Reed will lead a discussion of *Gender Queer: A Memoir* by nonbinary, queer author and illustrator Maia Kobabe. This 2019 graphic memoir recounts Kobabe's journey from adolescence to adulthood growing up non-gender-conforming, exploring gender identity and sexuality, ultimately identifying as being outside of the gender binary. The American Library Association ranked it as the most challenged/banned book in schools and public libraries in 2021, 2022, and 2023.
