THE EPISTLE 1 Corinthians 15:1-11 Mrs. Dean

Leader: A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians, the fifteenth chapter.


I would remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to you--unless you have come to believe in vain.

For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them--though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

THE GOSPEL Luke 5:1-11 Rev. Samuelson

Leader: A reading from the gospel according to Luke, the fifth chapter.

Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep water and let down

your nets for a catch." Simon answered, "Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets." When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. So they signaled their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!" For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people." When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

ABOUT TODAY'S MUSIC

Today's music includes works of several notable composers of color. Doris Akers, composer of "There's a sweet, sweet spirit," was named "the foremost black gospel songwriter in the United States" by the Smithsonian Institution in 1992 and was noted for her ability to straddle the gulf between black and white gospel. Doris lived in Columbus from 1970-1988, serving as a soloist and choir director with Pentecostal churches and collaborating with artists such as Mahalia Jackson and preachers Jim Bakker and Tammy Faye Messner.

Eurydice Osterman, composer of "Create in me a clean heart," is a Fulbright scholar and published author and composer whose works have been read and performed around the world. She holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in composition from The University of Alabama in Tuscaloosa, and is the first female and African American to graduate with this degree.

Marques L.A. Garrett, composer of "Seek ye first," is an associate professor of choral studies at the University of North Texas. An avid composer of choral and solo-vocal music, his compositions have been performed to acclaim by high school all-state, collegiate, and professional choirs including Seraphic Fire, the Oakwood University Aeolians, and the National Lutheran Choir. His work in researching non-idiomatic choral music of Black composers resulted in the anthology The Oxford Book of Choral Music by Black Composers released in February 2023.

Fela Sowande, considered the father of Nigerian art music. A mix of western and African ideas prevail in his organ music such as Obangiji, which translates from Yoruba as "God Almighty." In his later years, Sowande taught in the Department of Pan-African Studies at Kent State University. He is buried in Randolph Township, OH.
