

THE SECOND READING

Hebrews 11: 1-3, 8-16

Nancy Braverman

Leader: A reading from the Letter of Paul to the Hebrews, the eleventh chapter.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old— and Sarah herself was barren— because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

† Music Notes

The four stanzas of the Processional Hymn "Awake, my soul" are just a few of the original fifteen stanzas of the morning hymn sung daily by the boys at Winchester College in the late 17th century. The final stanza is the original source of the doxology text "Praise God from whom all blessing flow."

The Johnson brothers created "Lift every voice and sing" for a Jacksonville, Florida celebration of Abraham Lincoln's birthday in 1900. A chorus of five hundred black school children sang it that day. Today we sing the first and third stanzas, but encourage you to reflect on the middle stanza which so specifically speaks to African Americanhistory in our country.

Bitter the chastening rod,

Felt in the days when hope unborn had died;

Yet with a steady beat,

Have not our weary feet

Come to the place for which our fathers sighed?

We have come over a way that with tears has been watered.

We have come, treading our path through the blood of the slaughtered,
