After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

Have you wondered about recycling beauty products?

We found a nonprofit that recycles them! Products like mascara tubes and wands, droppers and applicators, pumps and dispensers, caps, colored glass bottles and jars, plastic and aluminum squeezable tubes, toothpaste tubes, and floss containers!

Three reasons beauty products can't be accepted in regular recycling bins are that they are small containers, made of mixed materials, and aren't labeled with a recycling number.

So... these products can be taken to Sephora and Ulta Beauty stores and placed in a special bin for the Pact Collective. Pact is a nonprofit collective uniting the beauty industry to reduce beauty packaging waste and work collaboratively toward more circular solutions for the industry. BREAD Earth Day Forum Congregation Tifereth Israel Wednesday, April 22, at 10 a.m.

The BREAD Forum is "Our Trees, Our Health - Why Tree Loss Matters" and will share compelling data and analysis from health care experts and others about the growing health problems in Columbus neighborhoods caused by tree canopy loss. Learn what the city can do to protect mature trees, and improve public health outcomes for vulnerable residents.

The topics that will be covered include:

- The link between tree canopy loss and respiratory illness, heat stress, and mental health
- The exceptionally low tree canopy in Columbus
- Disparities in tree coverage across Columbus neighborhoods
- Policy solutions to protect mature trees and expand urban canopy
