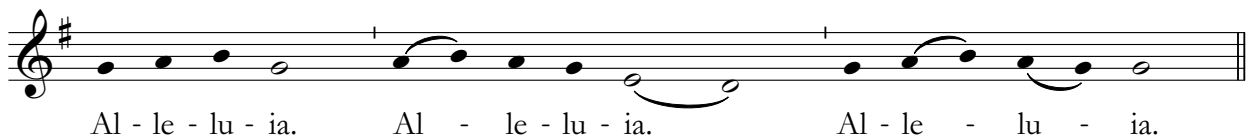

Cash and dedicated gifts today support **Church World Service** (CWS), a faith-based organization that is a strong global partner of the United Church of Christ. For over 30 years, CWS has also worked closely with us here at First Church, where they've supported programs like Bethlehem On Broad Street and our Unsheltered Ministry. And when disaster strikes anywhere, CWS emergency programs gear up and step in to ensure that our most vulnerable neighbors receive the support they need for rebuilding their lives. Often this support comes in the form of CWS disaster kits and supplies. These ready-to-use tools help people prepare for catastrophes in advance, and give them the materials needed to clean up in the aftermath of a disaster. For example, last year CWS distributed 71,760 hygiene kits and 17,317 blankets. Stocks of these and other necessities are now unusually low, so CWS needs an injection of funding and the efforts of local volunteers to replenish the supplies and assemble new kits. 

Schumacher Award Winners

Today we will welcome and acknowledge the five winners of the 2026 Schumacher Awards. Trustees of First Congregational administer the will of the late Frederick W. Schumacher. Under the terms of his will, "young women between the ages of fifteen and twenty years old who are eminently worthy of commendation for showing Christian devotion to their mother, father, sister, or brother" are to be selected for the Schumacher Award. Mr. Schumacher's will of 1958 established this award as a memorial to his mother, Mary Schumacher. They were both long-time members of The First Congregational Church.

The Schumacher Committee selected our five (5) recipients. Each will be awarded \$5,000 and an engraved medallion. There is no restriction as to the use of the award.

This year, B.R.E.A.D. is fighting for progress on three urgent campaigns: 1) Rental Registry – ensuring safe, accountable, and dignified rental housing; 2) Environmental Justice – protecting the health of our neighborhoods and our tree canopy; 3) Livable Wage – making sure pathways are provided to livable wage careers. B.R.E.A.D. – Living Wage

On Cleveland Avenue, between Morse and Dublin-Granville Roads in Columbus, a sign features a young girl, whose very eyes plead her needs. The sign tells us to “End Poverty.” As Jesus has told us in Mathew 26:11, this is an unlikely outcome, however much is required of us.

So, we try. B.R.E.A.D. took up the issue of a living wage last year. It has identified three groups most affected by the livable wage gap: citizens returning to society after a period of incarceration, senior citizens, and adults with children. Minimally, a single adult needs a wage of \$18-20 an hour, but add children, and the wage really needs to be closer to \$41. The non-tipped hourly wage in Columbus, Ohio is \$11. The May Harper's Index reports that in January 2015, the number of Americans working two full-time jobs was 172,000. In January 2026, that number was 476,000.

B.R.E.A.D. is investigating, among other options, a hoped-for expansion of a program run by Columbus City Schools. Career and Technical Education (CTE) via Career Pathways has three academies with programs that train students for jobs with livable wages. The prospective goal is to grow to 29 academies by 2029.

Angela Chapman, superintendent of Columbus City Schools, will speak at B.R.E.A.D.'s Nehemiah Action to explain how these Career Pathways can lead to livable wage employment. Please join us at the Nehemiah Action at the Celeste Center (Ohio State Fair Grounds) on Tuesday, May 12, 2026. Doors open at 6 p.m.

As B.R.E.A.D. searches for ways to “solve poverty,” we ask: *O God, to those who have hunger give BREAD and to those who have BREAD give the hunger for justice!* -- Latin American prayer.
