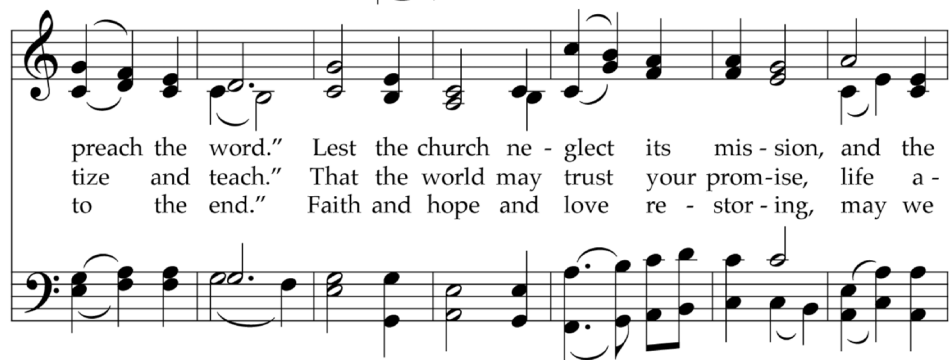

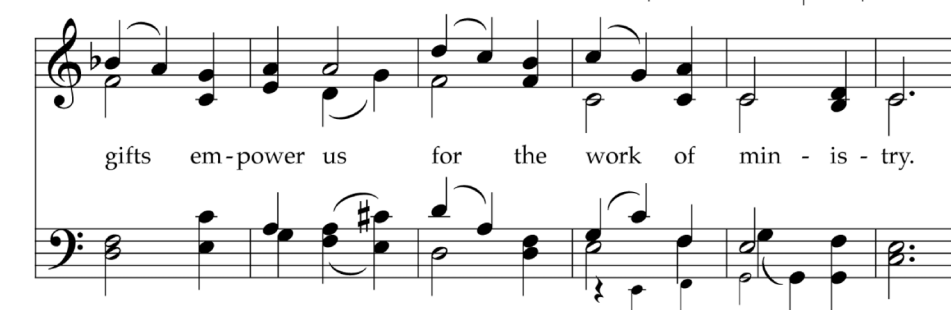

Exodus 19:2-8a

Leader: A reading from the Book of Exodus, the nineteenth fifth chapter.

They had traveled from Rephidim into the desert of Sinai and camped there, in front of the mountain. *THE GOSPEL

Matthew 9:35-10:8

Rev. Reed

Leader: A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew, beginning in the ninth chapter.

Jesus continued touring all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of God's reign and curing all kinds of diseases and sicknesses. At the sight of the crowds, Jesus' heart was moved with pity because they were distressed and dejected, like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus said to the disciples, "The harvest is bountiful but the laborers are few. Beg the overseer of the harvest to send laborers out to bring in the crops." Jesus summoned the Twelve, and gave them authority to expel unclean spirits and heal sickness and diseases of all kinds. These are the names of the twelve apostles: the first were Simon, nicknamed Peter—that is, "Rock"—and his brother Andrew; then James, ben-Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas; Matthew, the tax collector; James, ben-Alphaeus; Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot; and Judas Iscariot, who betrayed Jesus. These twelve Jesus sent out after giving them the following instructions: "Don't visit Gentile regions, and don't enter a Samaritan town. Go instead to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, make this proclamation: 'The reign of heaven has drawn near.' "Heal those who are sick, raise the dead, cure leprosy, expel demons. You received freely—now freely give.

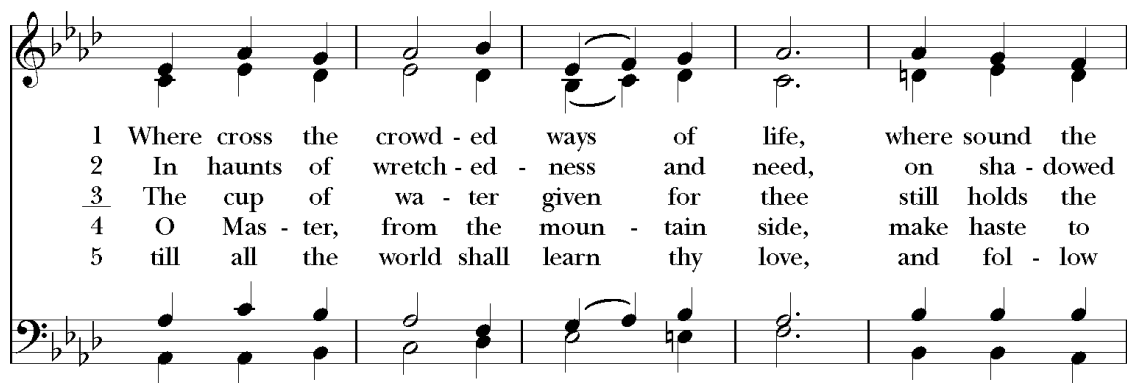

Out of gratitude to God and in keeping with our mission and values, every week our offering goes to support a vanguard humanitarian organization. Cash and designated gifts go to support the **Broad Street Food Pantry**, at Broad Street Presbyterian Church. In Franklin County, nearly 70,000 children now experience food insecurity, and this tragedy continues to rise in other age groups as well. The Pantry is now averaging 58 shoppers every day, a nearly 20% increase from last year. Rising food costs and changes to SNAP eligibility are placing growing pressure on families across our community. So the Pantry is growing its response to meet this need, helping seniors and working families access food when transportation, mobility, or work schedules make shopping difficult. Their delivery ministries now reach nearly 600 families monthly. Your contributions help the Pantry serve our neighbors in this time of urgent need. Thank you for your generosity.

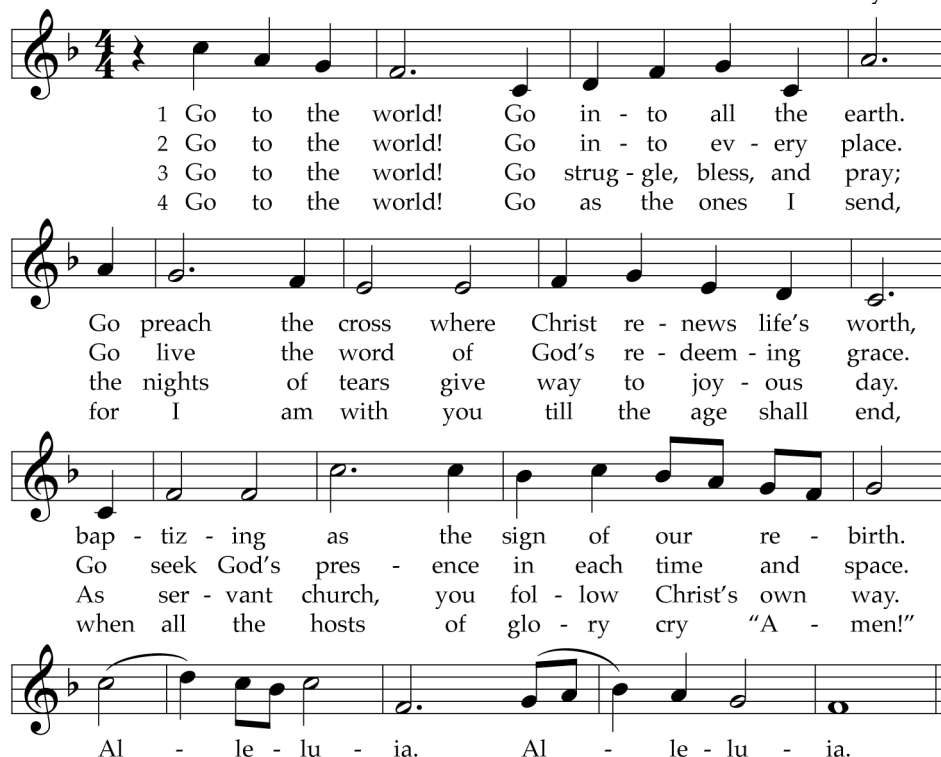

Preserving the Past, Stepping into the Future

There was a generation who built this house of God for us, and for the community. There was a generation who built an education wing for the children. There was a generation who birthed the Beckerath and renovated the Kimball so that we can hear the Holy Spirit sing. There was a generation who fixed the sanctuary roof and gave us air conditioning.

Clearly, they set goals, made sacrifices, and now we are the beneficiaries. Some of you are among these committed donors of our past. We are grateful for your love and support of our church home. We join you, to be the current generation of caretakers for this place of inspiration.

Now, it will be our resources and our work that will preserve the past while we step together into the future. We are not just giving dollars to a fundraising campaign, we are investing in tomorrow. We are not stuck treading water during a transition period, instead we are moving and growing and doing with purpose.

What will a candidate for minister surmise from our efforts? Perhaps more important than the dollars raised will be the level of participation. How many actually will join in the cause? It is a litmus test to demonstrate that we are truly a vibrant community of faith: one worth joining, one worth leading.

You will be invited this summer to one of several information sessions held throughout the community and here at church where you can learn more about the preservation grant project and how you can help support it. Be sure to respond to the invitation. Plan to attend a session to learn how you can help to support this project. Every new dollar given by the congregation will unlock \$4 of other support for the preservation project.

The \$200,00 fundraising campaign will support the Preservation Grant Project that involves replacing the front steps, restoring the Rose Window, and repairing mortar, stone, and some windows around the 1931 building.
