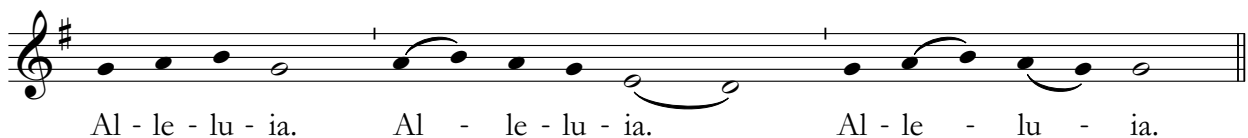

Matthew 14:13-21

When Jesus heard about the beheading, he left Nazareth by boat and went to a deserted place to be alone. The crowds heard of this and followed him from their towns on foot. When Jesus disembarked and saw the vast throng, his heart was moved with pity, and he healed their sick. As evening drew on, the disciples approached Jesus and said, “This is a deserted place and it is already late. Dismiss the

crowds so they can go to the villages and buy some food for themselves.” Jesus said to them: “There is no need for them to disperse. Give them something to eat yourselves.” “We have nothing here,” they replied, “but five loaves and a couple of fish.” “Bring them here,” Jesus said. Then he ordered the crowds to sit on the grass. Taking the five loaves and two fish, Jesus looked up to heaven, blessed the food, broke it, and gave it to the disciples, who in turn gave it to the people. All those present ate their fill. The fragments remaining, when gathered up, filled twelve baskets. About five thousand families were fed.

Good Works!

Engaging with Our Church and Our Community ... January – June 2026

Our church has been busy during 2026. Our church members continue to respond to God's call and serve one another.

Board of Trustees

Fiduciary responsibility

- Each month Trustees oversee the growth, protection, and administration of both restricted and unrestricted endowment funds in support of the activities, life, and ministry of First Church. This is done through investments and disbursements of funds held by the board in accordance with the instructions of donors and in compliance with Ohio law for endowment funds.
- Each month Trustees review performance reports from its investor entity, Manning & Napier Investments. Trustees also review restrictions that they have placed on investments by the company.
- Trustees have been involved in the process of receiving a distribution from G. Dene Barnard's estate, directed into two music funds.

Endowment funds

- Trustees initiated a more directed plan to actively encourage church members to contribute to the endowment funds, and to make special gifts for the benefit of the church, its needs, and its missions.
- Trustees created a "Thank You" card to acknowledge gifts to endowment funds.

Insurance

- Trustees have been in conversation with the church's insurance provider to ensure that adequate insurance for the church, its activities, and property is maintained at all times.
- Trustees are in the process of updating the insurance policy to include sexual misconduct liability.

West Lot

- A financial review of funds going back 15 years relative to the West Lot and its mortgage was completed.
- A revised contract with CCAD for use of the parking lots was negotiated.

Preservation Grant

- Trustees have kept abreast of the progress of the Preservation Grant for monies for work in and around the church, and the progress of the upcoming capital campaign.

Legacy Sunday

- Trustees have started planning for this year's Legacy Sunday picnic on Sunday, September 27, 2026, in cooperation with the Church Vitality Commission. Mark the date in your calendar.

Preserving the Past, Stepping into the Future

Construction for the grant preservation project began Monday, July 20, by Berglund Construction Co. Scaffolding is erected for repairs to take place on the Broad St. side of the church. As a reminder, the front steps and front doors will not be accessible until close to the end of this year. All usual entrances to the church (other than the front doors) will continue to be available to use including the narthex door on the west side of the church. Parking lots will not be impacted during the construction. Thank you for your flexibility and understanding.
