LISTENING

THE FIRST READING

Exodus 16:2-15

Leader: A reading from the Book of Exodus, the sixteenth chapter.

They began to complain against Moses and Aaron there in the wilderness. The people of Israel said to them, "If only we had died by YHWH's hand in the land of Egypt, when we sat next to pots of meat and ate our bread till we were filled! But now you have brought the whole community out into this wilderness to die of hunger!"

Then YHWH said to Moses, "Look, I will rain down bread from heaven for you. The people will go out and gather a day's portion every day, so that I can test them to see if they will follow my instructions. " On the sixth day, when they prepare what they brought in, it will be twice as much as the daily gathering."

So Moses and Aaron said to the Israelites, “In the evening you will know that it was YHWH who brought you up out of Egypt, and in the morning you will witness the glory of God, the One to whom you directed your complaints, for who are we, that you should complain to us?” Moses continued, “It is YHWH who will give you meat in the evening for your meal, and all the bread you want in the morning, because YHWH has heard your complaints. For it is not to us that you are complaining—who are we? But to YHWH.”

Then Moses said to Aaron, “Tell the whole Israelite community, ‘Present yourselves before YHWH, who has heard your complaints.’”

As Aaron was speaking to the whole Israelite community, they looked toward the desert, and there was the glory of YHWH appearing in the form of a cloud. Then YHWH spoke to Moses and said, “I have heard the complaining of the people of Israel. Say this to them: ‘In the evening you will eat meat, and in the morning you will have your fill of bread. Then you will know that I, YHWH, am your God.’”

So it came about that in the evening quail flew in and all around the camp. And in the morning there was a layer of dew all around the camp; when the layer of dew evaporated, there on the surface of the desert were flakes of something: delicate, powdery, fine as frost.

When they saw this, the people of Israel said to each other, “What is it?”, not knowing what it was. But Moses told them, “This is the bread YHWH has given you to eat.”

“The kingdom of heaven is like the owner of an estate who went out at dawn to hire workers for the vineyard. After reaching an agreement with them for the usual daily wage, the owner sent them out to the vineyard. “About mid-morning, the owner came out and saw others standing around the marketplace without work, and said to them, ‘You go along to my vineyard and I will pay you whatever is fair.’ At that they left. “Around noon and again in the mid-afternoon, the owner came out and did the same. Finally, going out late in the afternoon, the owner found still others standing around and said to them, ‘Why have you been standing here idle all day?’ ““No one has hired us,’ they replied. “The owner said, ‘You go to my vineyard, too.’ “When evening came, the owner said to the overseer, ‘Call the workers and give them their pay, but begin with the last group and end with the first.’ When those hired late in the afternoon came up, they received a full day’s pay, and when the first group appeared they assumed they would get more. Yet they all received the same daily wage. “Thereupon they complained to the owner, ‘This last group did only an hour’s work, but you’ve put them on the same basis as those who worked a full day in the scorching heat.’ ““My friends,’ said the owner to those who voiced this complaint, ‘I do you no injustice. You agreed on the usual wage, didn’t you? Take your pay and go home. I intend to give this worker who was hired last the same pay as you. I’m free to do as I please with my money, aren’t I? Or are you envious because I am generous?’ “Thus the last will be first and the first will be last.”

Out of gratitude to God and in keeping with our mission and values, every week our offering goes to support a vanguard humanitarian organization. This week, cash and designated gifts go to support First Church’s **Good Samaritan Fund**, a ministry that has served our neighbors in the Columbus community since 2002. Each month “Good Sam” provides financial help to people in need who come to our church seeking assistance. Over the years, the program has helped those facing serious hardships with many services, including payment of utility bills that are in disconnection status, providing gift cards for food or gasoline, and acquiring birth certificates. Every effort is made to meet the unique, emergency needs of these neighbors. Very often, the people we help are only one unexpected medical bill or other expense away from being evicted and becoming a homeless family. Increases in the number of folks in need, as well as rising costs, have led to reductions in how much Good Sam can offer each neighbor. Thank you for generous support of this vital First Church ministry to our wider community.

Preserving the Past, Stepping into the Future

Construction continues for the grant preservation project. In a few weeks, most of the tuckpointing work will be completed and the restored Rose Window will be reinstalled. Soon after, the front steps will be replaced. The project is on schedule and is to be completed by the end of this year.

As a congregation, we agreed to accept a \$250,000 national grant and the condition to raise any needed matching funds. All members and friends of the church are asked to turn in a pledge card no later than September 30. We need everyone's participation to raise the remaining \$200,000 towards the \$1 million grant project.

Faith Formation Aspirations

What does "aspiration" mean? A quick internet check of a dictionary definition shows it means reaching for a goal or item higher than what has been achieved either in the present or the past. To get ready for the stewardship campaign, the stewardship and growth commission asked the faith formation commission to discuss some of the highlights from this past year that will set the stage for the commission's aspirations for the coming year's activities.

This past year, faith formation provided opportunities for adult education throughout the year, K-6 education through the Godly Play program, and confirmation classes for middle school students. We also sent teens on a Washington DC mission trip and local activities, and helped children and families enjoy summer camp. Highlights of these activities include presentations by church members David Hogrefe and Brian Kemp about how they turned a hateful situation into an outreach opportunity for love and education about LGBTQ issues, as well as presentations from outside groups such as Equality Ohio and Kaleidoscope during Pride month. The DC mission trip was the first of its kind since before covid and provided our youth the opportunity to serve the unhoused and food insecure in urban DC while building on their faith and friendships. The church sent individual campers to Camp Christian and families to Camp Akita this summer and provided many outreach programs through First Serves. These are just some of the many activities and opportunities the commission planned and funded this year.

Having mentioned a few of the events faith formation took part in last year, what are we planning for the coming year of 2027? We would like to build on the experiences from the mission trip by taking more students and provide rich experiences by going further afield to a native American reservation or other location in need. We'd also like to provide camp experiences for more children. To help make this happen, a large item on the wish list the commission plans to send to church council will be to increase the hours of the interim faith formation director from 20 hours to 30 hours for planning and implementation of these projects. Though we would like to make this a full-time staff position, the commission understands there might not be enough money in the budget to make it full time. We also wish to expand youth activities to build bonds between the youth currently in confirmation and youth group.

On the aspirational wish list, and as there was before covid, faith formation would like to have a series of activities and classes about social justice and community issues as well as classes about spiritual issues or a bible study. Though these parallel tracks have been held during the 10 a.m. hour on Sundays, we could move these offerings outside of this timeslot to help strengthen bonds of friendship and allow more time for learning and discussion. Some coming attractions are the UCC101 lunch & learns during October with Rev. Dr. Nancy Livingston and Rev. Dr. Marti Baumer, and "How your vote affects health care in Ohio" with Dr. Cami Curren. We would welcome input from the congregation about topics and presenters for future series.

To conclude, the faith formation commission aspires to provide more building blocks for adult and youth spiritual development and issues of current interest and focusing on issues of social justice and civil discourse. By putting some of our aspirational wants out there, we can move the needle and accomplish those wants during this transitional time.
